Prevention, diagnosis and adequate management of complications are essential in current medical practice. This is especially true in facial plastic surgery. Patients with complications in this area are confronted with an aesthetic result-that can not be concealed-on a daily basis and often they will have to face up with associated functional problems. Randolph B. Capone and Jonathan M. Sykes therefore have given us an important and valuable book. In many textbooks and scientific literature this topic is often underestimated but they are inescapable for all who practice surgery of the face regardless of experience or expertise. This book is well balanced and structured; it contains 17 excellent chapters by a number of international renowned experts. All the major themes in facial plastic surgery are covered from minimally invasive to the most challenging reconstructive procedures. It focuses on the psychological aspects of the plastic surgery patient, which I believe is mandatory for a successful surgical outcome.
